3. Recent experience of teaching Music in an 11-18 College.
4. Experience of and willingness to assist with extra-curricular activities.
5. Demonstrate excellent oral and written communication skills.
6. Demonstrate knowledge, understanding and commitment to integrated education.
7. Demonstrate development of quality learning and teaching.

DESIRABLE CRITERIA

1. Recent {within the last five years} full-time teaching beyond PGCE in an 11 to 18 College.
2. Experience of teaching GCSE Music in a class setting.
3. Have recent experience of using computer sequencing software to aid composition.
4. Evidence of professional development within the subject area.
5. Experience of teaching SEN and Bi-lingual pupils.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

The Board of Governors may enhance the above criteria to achieve a manageable shortlist.

The assessment process for this post will include an interview and an observed taught lesson.
